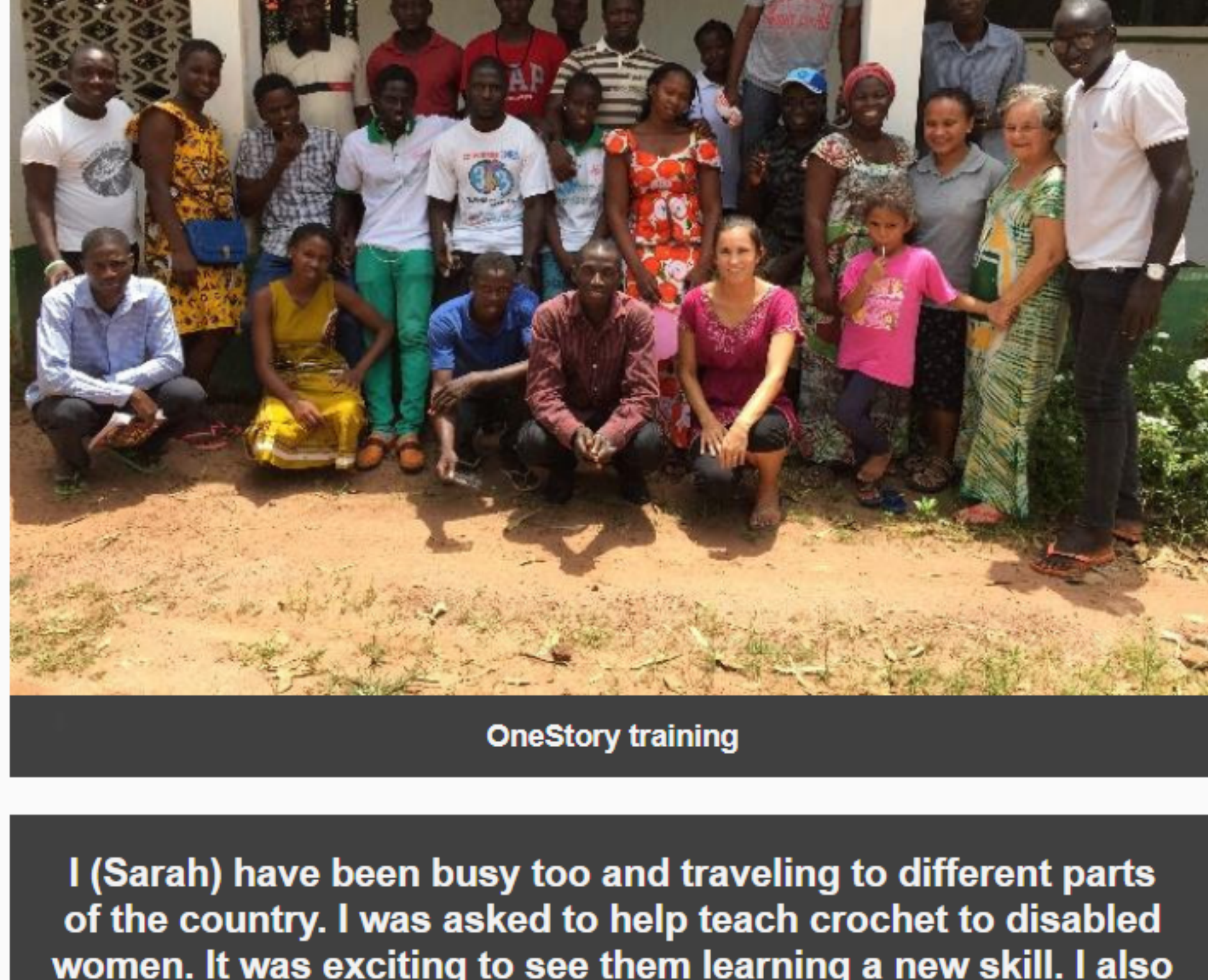


Working with our Guinean builders has helped me build relationships as well as work on language daily.

Although I have built lots of relationships with locals during construction, I look forward to finishing and having more time to intentionally build relationships with others in the village and continue learning language. It is hard feeling like such an outsider and having people stare at you everywhere you go. I have had some time after work in the late afternoons to go to the market and sit with local men. We sit and drink tea and talk about all sorts of things. I can definitely see how God is using my experience working with African Muslim people groups in Atlanta to better engage the people here. They seem surprised and thankful that I know some about their religion and am willing to talk about it with them. I look forward to the day when my language skills are good enough to have deeper conversations about our beliefs.



OneStory training

I (Sarah) have been busy too and traveling to different parts of the country. I was asked to help teach crochet to disabled women. It was exciting to see them learning a new skill. I also recently helped lead two OneStory workshops with my Guinean colleague Ivonete. In the first one we helped the Fula team in crafting Bible stories. They are making good progress and were encouraged. In the second one we invited leaders from local churches in Gabu, a city about 3 hours from Quebo. We were excited to have about 30 participants from six different churches. We taught the Acts stories crafted in Kriol. It was very moving to see God working through the stories as we discussed what we learned in the stories that would help the church as a whole grow. One thing that surprised me was their emphasis of the need to give sacrificially. I was humbled to hear their stories. One guy said he once gave all of his transportation money to a brother in need. Later, God sent someone to give him the money he needed. We were all encouraged as we learned Bible stories, listened to how God spoke to us through the stories, and prayed for the Fula people.
